From the desk of Training Officer Franklin:

"Greetings All, I hope this post finds you well. There are a few things that I wanted to remind you about with documentation. For Strokes/TIA/Stroke Like S/S, please include the following information in the narrative: blood glucose, last known well time, stroke scale (it would be helpful to know which one was used), and that you activated the stroke team (stroke activation). These are important items needed for patient care and for AHA's Mission Lifeline. Additionally, when dealing with STEMIs please include the following information: a 12 lead within ten minutes of patient contact, Aspirin should be administered in a confirmed STEMI unless the patient is allergic to it, and that you alerted the receiving hospital within 10 minutes of arrival. SAMPLE and OPQRST are now indicated for QA Grading. You should also include a general impression and use XABCDE when detailing the primary assessment. Please review the new QA Grading Sheet to familiarize yourself what is required for EPCRs. Thank you for all that you do! Be safe out there."
